
Identifying Health Needs

A community health needs assessment was conducted from May 2016 to September 2016. Community input was provided through a community health survey completed by 31 key stakeholders, including representatives from:

- ✓ Hospitals and healthcare facilities
- ✓ Social service agencies
- ✓ Local school systems and educational organizations
- ✓ Public health agencies
- ✓ Other medical providers
- ✓ Local elected officials and governmental agencies
- ✓ Local businesses

Population demographics and socioeconomic characteristics of the community were gathered and reported utilizing various third parties. The health status of the community was then reviewed. Information on the leading causes of death and morbidity information was analyzed in conjunction with health outcomes and factors reported for the community by CountyHealthrankings.org and other third parties.

This data was analyzed and reviewed to identify health issues of uninsured persons, low-income persons and minority groups, and the community as a whole. As a result of the analysis described above, the following health needs were identified as the most significant health needs for the community:

The identified health needs were reviewed by *Thrive Marshall County* (community wellness coalition) and priority areas, included in the table below, were determined based on their assessment of the qualitative and quantitative data.

PRIORITY 1: Obesity

Goal 1: To increase awareness of healthy eating and reduce food insecurity.

- Strategies: A. Health & wellness educational displays set up in hospital & medical clinics. Displays provided by Marshall County Extension Service, and rotated every month. Public fills out evaluation forms to provide feedback on displays.
 - B. Continue hospital's role in providing Meals on Wheels for community.
 - C. Participate in local and area health fairs, e.g. Parents as Teachers Early Childhood Health & Safety Fair (held every year in April).

Goal 2: To increase exercise opportunities for the community.

- Strategies: A. Continue efforts with USD 364 to replace and/or repair sidewalks as necessary near local schools in Marysville (Marysville Elementary School, St. Gregory's Catholic School, and Good Shepherd Lutheran School), pursuing grants from the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) Safe Routes to Schools Program.
 - B. As practicable, partner with community organizations, including schools, to support and encourage healthy behaviors, lifestyles, and healthy aging. Continue hospital's role in providing Meals on Wheels for community.

PRIORITY 2: Improve Awareness of Mental Health Providers and Mental Health Services

Goal 1: Increase awareness of and utilize mental health providers in the community.

- Strategies: A. Invite mental health professionals and representatives (including Pawnee Mental Health Services) to join *Thrive Marshall County*, a community wellness coalition which evolved from the 2013 Marshall County Health Needs Assessment.
 - B. Meet with Pawnee Mental Health Services to become aware of, and familiar with, resources and services available to the community.

Goal 1: Provider education and outreach regarding mental health conditions and available mental health services in the community.

Strategies: A. Partner with Pawnee Mental Health Services to conduct an Adult Mental Health First Aid course for hospital employees, emergency services, law enforcement officials, school districts, etc. The 8-hour training course is designed to give members of the public key skills to help someone who is developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis.

Needs Not Addressed

Some issues identified through the Community Health Needs Assessment have not been addressed in this plan. In initial discussion and subsequent prioritization, Community Memorial Healthcare considered the levels to which some needs were already being addressed in the service area. Additionally, some community needs fall outside of the scope of expertise and resources of Community Memorial Healthcare. The following chart outlines how some of the needs identified in the assessment are addressed by others or in different ways:
